### What character do you play in Stupid Kid? Franny Hawker

#### How does that character contribute to the message of the play?

Franny is the modern day version of a Greek chorus. She watches & listens. Her comments further on the plot and helps set the time and place of what happens in this small town.

## How are you preparing as an actor to portray your character?

First I had to set aside any preconceived ideas that I was carrying as Michelle. To create Franny, I used the playwright's observations about Franny's character and Cameron's brilliant nudges & the interactions I have with the other characters. I found visuals that came into my life One morning I was throwing apples to some deer high up on a mountain. Watching from afar, I noticed how she kept chewing and slowly observing everything around her. This unexpected visual helped me step out of my own way and just 'inhabit' my character of Franny.

# Tell us about working with your director and fellow cast members.

What a joy! Cameron Watson is an actors' director. He gives you clues and freedom to go from one level to the next.

And, I adore my fellow cast members. There is such a strong, creative bond between us. Sharr's beautiful play is so intense, it is lovely to be able to cry, laugh & make really bad jokes together.

#### What do you hope audiences will take away from seeing the play?

Talk about family. Talk about country. Talk about love being the answer.
