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'Sucker Punch' at Tiger Boxing Gym

The essentials: Racial tensions and Thatcher-era politics go head to head in Roy Williams' award-winning boxing drama. Amid the turbulence of unemployment, friends square off in the ring in the hope — perhaps deluded — that a sports title might offer a way out.

Why this? Staged in a real-life boxing gym by guest director Michael A. Shepperd (artistic director at Celebration Theatre), Coeurage Theatre Company's limitedrun revival pulls no punches in what could be the most visceral depiction of boxing on an L.A. stage since 1996's "Blade to the Heat." Challenging theater at pay-whatyou-want ticket pricing is the Coeurage mission.
